Continuous training, both in-house and supported by outside agencies, to ensure the highest quality of teaching. This is to better effect outcomes for all children. Staff trained in programmes such as the nationally recognised 'Elklan' Speech and Language program, enabling them to further identify and support Speech and Language difficulties across the school; Resources: Additional resources necessary to support children's learning, e.g. equipment, books to ensure all children have access to as wide a range of literacy resources as possible.
